Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength.

1 Corinthians 1:22-25

Wisdom is a precious gem. What makes it so valuable is its rarity. All people, to a greater or lesser degree, possess intelligence. Human beings are clever creatures endowed with reasoning minds. That's a given. However, as the philosopher Euripides once said, "cleverness is not wisdom". What's more, wisdom is somehow tied into that other great gem, 'truth'. And like real gems found among the rocks, wisdom can show up in the most unexpected places. It can come out of the mouths of babes, out of the depths of the years, or out of the jumbled speech of fools.

about biblical prophets and storied saints who made known God's wisdom through their folly. It is among the humble, the downtrodden, and the odd that the truth is often best exhibited and where virtue can most flourish. It is in our sane, rational, and well managed lives that we sometimes overlook and neglect the good news that is so much part of our faith. We are

to seek truth and wisdom, and if that means accepting the foolish from time to time, from ourselves and others, then so be it.

Wisdom also means understanding that others, especially people with whom we share little in common, can be our greatest teachers. At our Fall Conference in Antigonish, the Reverend Val Rhymes gave a presentation on differing faith perspectives that are at work within all our parishes. Our faith is a wonderful expression of who we are as God's children, yet it can sometimes act as a key source of conflict. Tensions will stem from our inability to appreciate the diversity and merit of coexisting spiritualities, i.e. the ways we see God, especially if we assume we are right and others are wrong.

Together there is plenty of wisdom among Diocesan Lay Readers. I would like to thank everyone who has helped to bring this living ministry to the forefront. For those of you who exercise lay reading duties within your parishes, your examples of faithful service are viewed far and wide by parishioners and outsiders alike. Never underestimate the impact you make. For those who have taken on leadership positions within our organization, I would like to extend my own personal appreciation. To the President, Wade Seymour, and Vice President Shirley Williams, to our Secretary, Marie Ayotte, to our treasurer Wayne Hamlin, to our former President, Dennis Eisan, for attending to medallions while being a source of sage advice, and to our various Regional Representatives, your work is incalculable. So, too, have been the efforts of the Board of Standards. The Diocesan Lay Readers' Association has been very well served this past year.

In closing I would like to mention particular kudos to someone who has been a tireless resource and dedicated member of our team, Jonni Turner, who has served as Editor and distributor of the *Diakonia* over the past number of years. This is a very big job and one that requires dexterity, patience, and expertise and she has done it while working full time and studying full time. Jonni, your good works speak for themselves. Well done good and faithful servant. Meanwhile, Victoria Henrikson has kindly agreed to come on the Board as Editor (assisted by her husband Victor). We welcome their willingness to take on this vital communications role.



President's Message

In Colossians 3:5-10, Paul says: Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly. You must get rid of all such things - anger, wrath, malice, slander and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator.

The yard was a mess. Winter weather and high winds had scattered tree branches, dead leaves and hundreds of pine cones over our property. The whole place needed a thorough cleanup.

I set to work, and soon I had assembled a sizeable stack of sticks. Grabbing a rake, I mounded pine cones and needles into a thick pile. Several hours passed. I stopped to check my progress; the yard looked neat and tidy. The grass was still brown and dry but as I knelt for a closer look, I saw tiny green shoots. Spring was coming but these signs hadn't been noticeable until the debris was removed.

Sometimes our spiritual lives are like our yards - brown, barren and littered with debris. Like a thorough yard cleanup, the six weeks of Lent give us a chance to examine ourselves, to focus on our spiritual lives and to remove the debris so new growth can emerge.

How many of us see ourselves in the above story? As we are told, it is time to get rid of the winter blahs and start anew. Spring is a time for new growth, budding flowers, warm weather, and birds returning - everything becomes more alive.

The committee and the Board of Standards have been busy. The syllabus for the new Lay Reader-in-Training course is a work in progress. We are hoping to have it available by early Summer. I would like to welcome and thank Victoria Henrikson who has agreed to be the new Editor of the Diakonia with the assistance of her husband, Victor. In February I had the privilege to attend a service in New Germany for the installation of a new Lay Reader-in-Training. If anyone else would like someone from the Executive to attend such a service, please contact Rev. Tom Henderson or me and one of us would gladly attend, if available.

Once again the Fall Conference was a huge success. Rev. Val Rhymes put on an awesome program, which was meaningful to all who attended. The only disappointment was the low number of attendees (only 22). On May 26th we will be having our Annual Meeting at St. John's, Lunenburg. The Fall Conference will be held September 21-23 at the Belcourt Centre in South Rustico, Prince Edward Island. In closing I hope you had a Happy Easter and I look forward to seeing you at the Annual Meeting in May in Lunenburg and the Fall Conference in September in Prince Edward Island.

The Diocesan Lay Readers' Association Annual Meeting was held in Church of the Holy Spirit, Dartmouth, N. S. on May 14, 2011. Wade Seymour, President was in the chair.

Following registration we held a Holy Eucharist service in Holy Spirit with The Reverend Tom Henderson as celebrant and preacher.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Wade Seymour who welcomed everyone. We opened with the Lay Readers' Prayer. There were a few minor changes to the agenda. Registration began at 9:30 a.m., the Church service was held at 10 a.m. and the meeting was called to order at 11:15 a.m. Wade asked everyone to introduce themselves.

PRESENT were Wade Seymour, President; The Reverend Tom Henderson, Warden; Dennis Eisan, Past President; Wayne Hamlin, Treasurer; and Marie Ayotte, Secretary and 21 members of the Lay Readers' Association.

CORRESPONDENCE none

BUSINESS ARISING The motion to increase registration fees was tabled to come up after the Treasurer's Report.

Diakonia – Extra copies were given to those who did not receive copies.

Board of Standards – The new syllabus and training program will not be ready until the end of the year. It is hoped to have a standardized program for everyone and also accessible on line. It will be subdivided according to topic and will be in 10-minute segments.

REPORTS The reports are printed in the Annual Meeting booklet. Shirley Williams moved and Dennis Eisan seconded the acceptance of the reports.

TREASURER'S REPORT Wayne Hamlin moved the acceptance of his report included in the Annual Meeting booklet. It was audited by I.G. Phillips, R.I.A. for the year April 1, 2010 to March 31, 2011. Seconded by Karan Manuel. Carried.

When questioned about a bank charge, Wayne explained it was for a NSF cheque. The 2010 legacy fund of \$700 was for training of the laity. Should we be collecting for other funds? If we have extra funds should they be used to subsidize people who have financial difficulty in attending the annual meeting or the fall conference? The Reverend Tom Henderson will raise this at a Board of Standards meeting.

Budget – Wayne explained that we try to stand on our own financially and the Diocesan Office appreciates this. Wayne Hamlin moved the budget be accepted as presented. Seconded by David Spencer. Carried. Wayne Hamlin moved the acceptance of I.G. Phillips as the auditor for the year 2011 to 2012. Seconded. Carried.

Notice of motion to increase registration fees – The treasurer does not feel a need for an increase at this time. Dennis Eisan moved and Jill Niely seconded that the motion to increase registration fees not be forwarded at this time. Carried.

Communications – Ways of getting the message out and encouraging all lay readers to attend annual meetings and conferences was discussed. All area reps should be passing on the news. It is difficult when there is a region with no area rep. As Lay Readers we should all take the responsibility to attend the annual meeting and conferences. The Reverend Tom will speak with Jan Connors about adding our meetings schedule in the Diocesan Times.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The Vice-President's position is vacant. Shirley Williams was nominated. There were no other nominations from the floor and Shirley accepted.
